



Support for people with a learning disability and autistic people – My Care and Treatment Review meeting (CTR)

A CTR is a special meeting which makes sure your care

is going well and looks at how it could go better.

- The full name for a CTR is a Care and Treatment Review meeting.
- If you go to school or college, it is called a CETR which stands for a Care, Education and Treatment Review.



- You may be asked if you would like a CTR meeting.
- If you say yes, it means you give your consent to the meeting.



- A CTR is a long meeting, it can take most of a day.
- You are the most important person in your CTR, so it is good for you to be there and to say what you think.
- You don't have attend all the way through, you can join for part of it and leave when you want.
- If you don't want to be there that's ok too.
 You can tell a support worker or family member what you'd like to say.

The other people who will be at the CTR are:



- The professionals who know and support you.
- A chairperson from the TCP team.
- An independent professional
- An expert by experience, who is someone else with a learning disability or an autistic person.
- You can invite your parents, an advocate or someone important to you.



What happens after the CTR?

- You should get a report from the chairperson within 2 weeks.
- It should be written in words you understand.
- It will say what needs to happen to make your care better.
